Cooling Assistance:

You may qualify for a free AC through the <u>Home</u> Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) Cooling Assistance Benefit. Applications open each spring and remain open until funding runs out.

Trees and Greenspace:

Trees help cool our city and clean our air. Use the <u>NYC Street Tree Map</u> to find out how to water, weed, and plant around your street tree.

Cooling Centers:

If you don't have AC in your home, you can use the_ <u>Cool Options map</u> to find cooling center locations and other ways to beat the heat.

Spray Caps:

<u>Request a hydrant spray cap</u> to stay cool when it's hot out without wasting water.
